Deer, Oh Dear!

There are a lot of "booby traps" that the unwary motorcyclist can ride into, including innocuous-looking alleyways, raised pavement edges, railroad tracks, loose sand, sunken manhole covers, tar snakes, and white plastic arrows glued to the pavement. Most of those hazards occur in the city. Out in the country on those twisty back roads we love to ride, we can expect some different types of booby traps.

One major trap that can spring on us is a wild animal, especially wild deer. Deer are so delicate and demure that it's hard to think of them as a hazard. But when we come upon the sickening sight of a dead deer along the highway, we are again reminded of the danger, both to the animal, and to ourselves.

Animal strikes are a significant hazard for those of us who enjoy long-distance travel. Statistically speaking, vehicle collisions are the major motorcycling hazard, but as motorcycling experience builds and we get a little smarter, our risks of a car/bike collision should decrease. But the risk of animal strikes remains high because animals are so difficult to predict. Wild deer are found all over North America, in large numbers, their population is increasing, and they have habits and instincts that put them on collision courses with motor vehicles.

The typical deer strike occurs with the animal suddenly leaping in front of the vehicle, often at night. The vehicle slams into the deer, with sickening consequences. What's startling is the amount of damage even a small deer can do to a speeding vehicle. If the motorist happens to be a **motorcyclist**, the odds are high that both deer and biker will be seriously injured. What's so insidious about motorcycle/deer collisions is the unpredictability.

You may have ridden for hundreds of thousands of miles, proficiently avoiding thousands of left-turners, alley jumpers, edge traps, graveled corners, and decreasing-radius turns. Then, on some easy country ride, a deer suddenly leaps out of the woods into your path, and **Thud**! We don't have reliable statistics on motorcycle/animal collisions, because many accidents don't get reported. The famous "Hurt Report" gathered statistics from only motorcycle accidents in the Los Angeles area, where there are few wild deer. But animal strikes are a frequent enough problem elsewhere, that we should practice appropriate countermeasures on those rides that take us into deer country.

Deer Instincts

To understand what to look for and what to do about deer, let's consider their instincts and habits. Deer are cautious, and prefer to hide in the trees. They like munching on tender foliage. So, in the summer, expect wild deer in forested areas or riverbeds where the trees and underbrush provide lots of cover and fresh salad. That lush roadside grass the highway department keeps mowed is a dinnertime favorite.

That means you should expect deer feeding along the shoulder of the road in shady areas. In the daytime, a deer feeding on the road shoulder will have it's head down, so it may look like a log in the ditch, or a mossy boulder, or a crumpled cardboard box. When the head comes up, you'll immediately see those large ears, and perhaps a rack of antlers.

Motorcycle Awareness

Over two-thirds of car-motorcycle crashes are caused by drivers, not by motorcyclists. The driver either does not see the oncoming motorcyclist at all or does not see the motorcyclist in time to avoid a crash.

Tips for Drivers:

Why Didn't I See That Motorcycle?

Drivers tend to look for other cars, not motorcycles.

Because of its smaller profile, a motorcycle is harder to see and you may find it more difficult to estimate the motorcycle's speed.

The motorcyclist's riding pattern is different from your driving pattern. Different actions may be needed for the same driving or highway situation. For example, you may ignore a piece of road debris as a driver; however, that same piece of road debris may be deadly for a motorcyclist.

Traffic, weather, and road conditions require a motorcyclist to react differently than a driver, thus it is more difficult for you to judge and to predict cues that may require the motorcyclist to take an evasive action.

What Are Some Situations When Crashes Are Most Likely to Occur?

Car making a left turn: You are attempting a left turn in front of a motorcycle operator.

<u>Riding in your blind spot</u>: A motorcyclist is riding in your blind spot and you may not see the motorcycle. Additionally, you may fail to adequately check blind spots before changing lanes or making turn.

<u>Hazardous road conditions</u>: Potholes, wet leaves, railroad tracks and other road obstructions may dictate that a motorcyclist take an action that you may or may not.

<u>Obstructed line of sight</u>: Large vehicles, such as sport utility vehicles, delivery vans, and large trucks may block a motorcycle from your view and the motorcyclist may seem to suddenly appear.

How Can I Become More Aware of Motorcyclists?

<u>Respect the motorcyclist</u>: Remember the motorcycle is a vehicle with all of the privileges of any vehicle on the roadway. Give the motorcyclist a full lane of travel.

<u>Look out</u>: Look for the motorcyclist at intersections, when a motorcyclist may be making a left turn, and on the highway, when a motorcyclist may be changing lanes. Clearly signal your intentions.

<u>Anticipate a motorcyclist's maneuver</u>: Obstructions that you do not notice may be deadly for a motorcyclist. Predict evasive actions.

<u>Allow plenty of space</u>: Don't follow a motorcycle too closely. Allow enough room for the motorcyclist to take evasive actions.







Transitions...

We all know that change is inevitable and it appears that the heat of summer is finally giving way to fall. At this time of year everything seems to be in transition—the temperatures are dropping, the amount of daylight is decreasing, animals are changing their patterns (two legged as well as four) which is all pretty normal.

With that said it does mean that we will need to increase our diligence when we go about our daily routines. Here are just a few ideas to keep in mind when you next swing a leg over your trusty steed's seat!

n the morning it may be chilly. You will want to wear an extra layer of clothing that you can remove as the day heats up. You might want to carry two jackets. A mesh for the afternoon warmth and a full jacket for the morning chill. Better yet, get a jacket with a removable liner that you can zip in or out as needed. The summer mesh gloves may be fine in the afternoon, but you might want some full leather gloves to start the day.

As the amount of daylight decreases we may now be traveling in some times of increased animal activity, especially deer, who while always a threat, seem to be more out and about during dusk or dawn.

L ven though you travel the same route every day you may now be riding with direct sun in your face. Sun glare is a major issue, it can absolutely blind you.

What about our two legged animals? Well, they do not like to use their headlights. You will find them driving before the sun is officially up without any headlights being on. This makes them extremely difficult to pick out of the background especially on tree covered roads. C heck those tire pressures! As the ambient temperature drops your tire pressures will also drop.

These are but a few of the items to consider before you start out on your daily journeys or special fall get-a-ways. Remember to inspect your machine before you ride making sure that all of your lights are properly working so that you may be seen and that the battery, fluids, controls and tires are prepared for the ride.

Fall is some of the best riding of the year! Make sure you get out there and enjoy it because before too long we will be complaining about the **cold....but that is a whole** different story and not one we want to consider right now!
